Clayton Halliday, Assistant Vice Chancellor and Campus Architect Design and Construction Management – University of Calif. Davis

Mr. Halliday is the senior manager in charge of approximately 90 employees consisting of professionally licensed architects and engineers, construction administrators, contracts specialists, and support staff. He is a member of the Administrative and Resource Management's senior leadership staff, and is actively engaged in a wide variety of policy issues and leadership initiatives. Under his leadership, DCM is responsible for the implementation and delivery of the large and complex Capital Improvement Program, with a current portfolio of active projects in excess of \$800 million consisting of new

buildings, renovation and renewal projects and infrastructure improvements. DCM provides the campus with a breadth of professional services and technical expertise including planning, programming, feasibility studies, design, engineering, project management, and construction administration. He directs DCM professional staff and consultant teams in developing the most appropriate design solutions, selecting proper building materials, and suitable construction contracting methods. This ensures that projects meet program and functional objectives, budget and schedule constraints and will support the campus' mission of education, research and public service for many years to come. He collaborates with colleagues on campus to assure proper stewardship of the physical environment and deliver projects that help create a sense of place for the campus that are at the forefront of sustainability and green building design and inspire a feeling of permanence and quality.

As a highly experienced Architect with 30 years in the private and public sectors, Clayton is an accomplished leader of professional staff and multi-disciplinary teams. He promotes transparency, collaboration and teamwork, and believes in building long-term relationships based on professionalism, ethics, and integrity. Before joining the University, he worked in the private sector as a Project Architect and Project Manager responsible for the design and management of a wide variety of private and public sector projects in northern California and New Mexico. Project types included office, retail, media, entertainment, resort, public utility and community college.

He received his Bachelor of Arts in Architecture in 1977 from the University of New Mexico and is a licensed Architect in the State of California. He is an active member of the American Institute of Architects, Association of University Architects, Society of College and University Planners, and the American Biological Safety Association. He has participated in the Executive Leadership and Management Institute at Stanford, and the Harvard University Graduate School of Design. He was the general session speaker at the 2005 Tradeline Inc. Conference on Bio-Containment Facilities. He has significantly influenced over 45 major projects while working for the University. His participation has ranged from that of direct project management to oversight as the Campus Architect. A few projects include the Life Sciences Addition, Mondavi Center for the Performing Arts, Genome and Biomedical Sciences Facility, Activities and Recreation Center, Mathematical Sciences Building, Sciences Laboratory Building, Multi-Use Stadium, Veterinary Medicine 3A and 3B, Robert Mondavi Institute for Wine and Food Science, Earth and Physical Sciences, and the Graduate School of Management.
